
Finally, if he did well, he was made a knight at a special ceremony. The king or another famous knight tapped him with a glove or sword and gave him a sword and other gifts.





Next, he became a knight's personal assistant, or squire. He took care of the knight's battle gear, and learned how to handle weapons for himself.












Meister Francke. Thomas Becket's Martyrdum






